Comrades, November is the month that we have the privilege to remember and honor veterans of the United States armed forces. Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 making it an annual observance, and it became a national holiday in 1938. Sixteen years later, then-President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed legislation changing the name to Veterans Day, declaring it a day to honor all those who served their country during war or peacetime. On this sacred day, the nation honors military veterans — living and dead — with parades and other observances across the country, including a ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. As members of VFW post 1481, we take this sacred obligation to remember and honor our veteran brothers and sisters very serious. Unfortunately, when we review the current census reports that account for veterans in the United States, we see that the veteran population in the US is rapidly declining. Below are the most current statistics available:

Most U.S. veterans are age 50 and older, with nearly half aged 65 and above.

Age demographics of U.S. veterans as of 2025:

- Over 65 years old: About 50% of all living veterans fall into this category, reflecting service in earlier conflicts like WWII. Korea and Vietnam.
- Ages 50-64: Roughly 25% of veterans are in this range, many of whom served during the Gulf War era or in the years following.
- Ages 35-49: Approximately 21% of veterans are between 35 and 54 years old. This group includes many who served post-9/11.
- Under 35: Only a small fraction is younger than 35.
- <u>Female veterans</u> are more concentrated in the younger age brackets, reflecting increased opportunities for women in the military since the 1980's.
- <u>Utah</u> has approximately 130,000 veterans as of 2023 according to the Utah Department of Veterans and Military Affairs. Of that 130,000, only 1260 are female. The largest group of these Utah veterans served during the Vietnam War/Era.

World War II

- Most surviving WWII veterans are now in their late 90s or older.
- California has the highest number, with around 5,094 veterans.
- Florida follows with 3,753, and *Texas* with 2,720.
- Alaska has zero surviving WWII veterans as of 2025.
- In 2000, there were about 5.7 million living WWII veterans.
- By 2030, projections estimate fewer than 8,000 will remain.

So, Comrades, with this rapidly declining population of American heroes, especially the WWII veterans, we need to stay focused and busy getting out into our community and honoring these men and women who honorably and faithfully served this nation. This eleventh day in the eleventh month of the year that has been federally designated as a day to remember and honor shout *NOT* be the only day we as a VFW Post get out into the community to show our appreciation for our veterans. We need to be engaged in this kind of service every day, all year long. I think about the words our current national commander, Carol Whitmore, stated during her inauguration speech. She stated:

"But I was driven by a sense of duty, a desire to serve something greater than myself. And little did I know that decision would shape me in ways I could never have imagined."

Comrades, let's adapt that same <u>Sense of Duty</u> and <u>Desire to Serve</u> that Commander Whitmore spoke of and make sure that those veterans living amongst us and the families of veterans who have passed on know that they will always be heroes to us and never be forgotten. Let's re-BOOT our Commitment to Action & Maximum Participation



VETERANS FIELD GUIDE TO GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN



The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is committed to provide quality, consistent care and services to Veterans, families, Caregivers, and Survivors. VA's mission allows no exception to this standard even when operations are limited by the absence of appropriations (commonly known as a "Government shutdown").



SERVICES TO VETERANS NOT IMPACTED:



SERVICES TO VETERANS IMPACTED:



VA Medical Centers, Outpatient Clinics, and Vet Centers will be open as usual and providing all services.



VA benefits will continue to be processed and delivered, including compensation, pension, education, and housing benefits.



Burlals will continue at VA national cemeteries. Applications for headstones, markers, and burlal benefits processing will continue.



The Board of Veterans' Appeals will continue decisions on Veterans' cases.



Call Centers: VA's primary call center (1-800-MyVA411) and the Veterans Crisis Line (Dial 988, Press 1) will remain open 24/7.



Suicide prevention programs, homelessness services, and caregiver support will continue.

VA will cease providing transition program assistance and career counseling.



Call Centers: VA's GI Bill (1-888-GIBILL-1) and National Cemetery Applicant Assistance (1-800-697-6947) hotlines will be closed.



VA benefits regional offices will be closed.



Public Affairs and outreach to Veterans will cease, including social media, VetResources emails, and responses to press inquiries.



No grounds maintenance or placement of permanent headstones at VA cemeterles.

Applications for pre-need burial at VA cemeterles will not be processed.

No printing of new Presidential Memorial Certificates.



No outreach to state, county, tribal, municipal, faith-based, and communitybased partners by VA Central Office,

In the event of a prolonged shutdown, VA will continue to review and update its plan in conjunction with the applicable legal requirements and circumstances. Please visit www.vA.gov for updated information.

With the current US Government shutdown, many veterans are concerned about how their benefits and care may be impacted.

Currently there are no major disruptions to veteran's medical care in UTAH.

US Government Shutdown and its Impact on Veterans Services

Services that will continue

- VA Health Care (VHA): All Veteran medical care and critical services will continue.

 This includes appointments, hospital operations, the Veterans Crisis Line (988 press 1), suicide prevention programs, homelessness programs and caregiver support.
- Compensation and Pension Benefits (VBA): The processing and payment of your
 monthly compensation, pension and Dependency and Indemnity Compensation
 (DIC) benefits will continue. Education benefit claims processing and payments, as
 well as insurance and loan guaranty programs, will also continue.
- Cemetery Services (NCA): Interments, scheduling, eligibility determinations and processing of headstones and markers will continue as necessary.
- Key Call Centers: The MyVA411 and the PACT Act Contact Center operations will remain open.

Services that will be suspended or cease

While core benefits are protected, the shutdown will disrupt some critical support and outreach services.

- Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E): Veteran outreach, including VR&E
 (Chapter 31) and Personalized Career Planning and Guidance (PCPG/Chapter 36)
 services, will be suspended.
- Education Call Center: The VBA Education Call Center (GI Bill Hotline) will be closed.
- Transition Assistance Programs (TAP): The VA's Transition Assistance Programs for service members leaving the military will be suspended.

• **Cemetery Operations:** Routine grounds maintenance, new Presidential Memorial Certificate (PMC) processing and permanent headstone or marker installations by NCA employees will cease.
